Police Department Forfeiture Grant

Police Forfeiture Grants are back. A portion of the money received from the sale of forfeited property is used to fund the Police Department's Forfeiture Grant Program. SPPD to impound cars

St. Petersburg Police Department Column

Beginning July 21, the St. Petersburg Police Department will again begin enforcing a City Ordinance that was first enacted in 1999 to authorize police officers to impound any motor vehicle that was used to solicit a prostitute, make a drug deal or carry illegal drugs

We suspended the use of our city ordinance in 2003 when a lawsuit in another Florida city (Mulligan v. City of Hollywood) challenged the legality of a similar law. In that case, the Fourth District Court of Appeals held that their impound ordinance was pre-empted by the Florida Contraband Forfeiture Act. The city appealed to the Florida Supreme Court, which overturned the appellate decision and upheld the validity of the ordinance.

The city ordinance allows officers to impound any vehicle when they have probable cause to believe it was involved in prostitution, or lewd and lascivious acts as defined by state statute, or in the purchase or use of illegal drugs.

The city ordinance applies only to vehicles that were under the control or use of its owner or co-owner at the time of the impoundment.

Car owners will have two options to recover their impounded vehicle: they can pay an administrative civil penalty of \$500.00 (which goes into the city's general fund), plus towing and storage fees, or they will have 15 days to contest the seizure by requesting an administrative hearing before a hearing master. If they take no action within 30 days, their car will be deemed abandoned and turned over to the towing company.

This city ordinance gives our police officers one more tool to help fight illegal drugs and prostitution in the city.

A Great Neighborhood Project

Many associations have improved their areas with signs, landscaping and lighting projects through the Neighborhood Partnership Grant Program. The Jungle Terrace Civic Association is doing a project to put members house numbers on their driveway rolled curb. This is done free of charge for all dues paying members. The number is put in the center of the driveway allowing EMS, Fire, Police, Mailmen, friends and Pizza delivery to find your home quickly. Many homes in our city are hard to find because of no numbers, small numbers or trees obstructing the numbers. We use large 6" numbers and paint a green background with a brush, let it dry and then spray the letters with a white oil base paint. The items needed to do the project are listed, total cost about \$125.00. You should be able to do about 80 homes with the listed paint purchase.

6" Plastic numbers \$83.00 (New City Sign), 1 Gallon Latex Paint \$25.00 (Home Depot or Lowes). 10 Cans White Spray Paint \$1.00ea. \$10.00 (Home Depot or Lowes), Masking Tape 3Rolls \$3.00 Total (Big Lots) Paint Brush \$1.00, Build a wood frame to hold letters, Pillow to kneel on, 12"x12" plastic milk carton to hold all items. While you are out painting you will meet other neighbors who may want to join your association because they want their number on the driveway also. We have numbered 53 of our members homes to date. If you have a question or would like to see a demonstration please call me 343-2041.

Help Yourself to Energy Savings

CONA Committee Reports

This is our new monthly feature to provide a brief summary for CONA members on CONA Committee progress. Please direct your questions to the appropriate Committee Chair.

- **AUDIT** – Keith Locke, Chair

The Audit Committee met and performed the audit of the first six months' financial activity.

- **COURT WATCH** – No update at this time.

- **LAND DEVELOPMENT/HISTORIC RESOURCES** –

Will Michaels, Chair

The Land Development and Historic Resources Committee continues to monitor the stadium and Tropicana Field redevelopment proposal, the "glitch" issues connected with the new Land Development Regulations, and historic resource matters. The City Council has finally agreed to initiate bringing Al Lang (Jeff Danner in a City Workshop clarified his intent was to also include Mahaffey and other land between Al Lang and the Airport) under downtown park zoning as twice requested by CONA. However, doing so will not limit building heights on that site to 75 feet (with a public hearing) as is the case with all of the other land zoned for park and recreational use. Heights may be up to 300 feet. This is an additional "glitch" that needs to be remedied. The Committee is also following up on its earlier report and recommendations regarding the Rays Owners' proposal for a new waterfront stadium (see CONA web site), and monitoring implementation of the ABC Coalition established by the Mayor to study alternative sites (requested by CONA) and financing.

Previously CONA approved proposed land development measures pending include: reducing the duration of site plan approval periods (now up to 7 years for projects under 60 units and 9 years for larger projects before a proposed project needs to start--potential for numerous vacant lots and temporary parking); limits on the length of construction projects (there are none now); and requiring applications approved under the old rules to comply with the new rules if major changes are made (See Chapter 16.70.010.9).

CONA Executive Board also supported Saint Petersburg Preservation's (SPP) request to protect various historic features of the 1926 Crislip Arcade at 645 Central Ave., and in particular not to board up the front of the building, which would detract from the appearance of the neighborhood and depress property values. The City Council approved this SPP/CONA request.

CONA BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S MEETING MINUTES

The Sunshine Multi-Service Center - July 16, 2008

- President Barbara Heck called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m., leading us in the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag.
- She welcomed our visitors, county and city government officials as well as current election candidates.
- Our first guest speaker was Jim Kennedy, (City Council District 2), who shared some "Green Ideas" he garnered during Council's recent trip to Takamatsu, Japan.
 - Recyclable trash collection was broken down by neighborhoods with a rotating responsibility to gather the materials to central salvage locations.
 - Public access bike loan facilities are provided to encourage free use of bicycles in lieu of motorized, (public or private), transportation.
 - The Councilman encouraged residents to join in two similar programs for St. Petersburg. He hoped that CONA would cooperate in formation of such special interest committees.
- Sheila Lopez, Director of Project Hope, was called forward to accept the CONA Citizen of The Month Plaque jointly awarded to Frank Murphy, President of Catholic Charities.
- April Gausman gave her Treasurer's Report that showed a current balance, (exclusive of CONA Leadership funding), of \$1,257.93.
- Travis Jarman, the Chairman of our By-laws Review Committee explained their work in seeking to identify glitches in our By-laws that remain since the last update in 2007. His current committee includes Mike Gulley, Will Michaels, and Cass Rael Sr.
- Will Michaels spoke for his LDR & Historic Preservation Committee.
 - Their most prominent success was in City Council approval of embracing Al Lang Field in the Downtown Waterfront Park Zone.
 - A needed height restriction was found to be lacking in the codes.
 - The withdrawal of the Ray's Waterfront Stadium Proposal has tabled Will's work in analyzing their proposed plans.
 - They have moved ahead with negotiations to preserve the Crislip Arcade from immediate demolition by the owners.
 - A meeting has been scheduled to review the city's proposed remedies to the identified LDR "Glitches".
- Newly appointed Membership Chair, Barbara Hawkins, reported on her work with several volunteers to recruit new CONA members and to reenroll associations that have lapsed.
- Moved, (Killian, Jungle Terrace), to ratify the application of Buena Vista Neighborhood Association for CONA Membership.
- Tom then explained the ground rules for our discussion. Julie Richey introduced a Power Point. Chris Calato answered for Buena Vista. Andrea Hildebran spoke for Bartlett Park and introduced a video presentation, then answered questions. Each group was afforded 12 minutes to present arguments, for or against, the motion to approve CONA membership for Buena Vista.
 - After viewing information videos from each of the contending groups, Tom opened the floor to questions from the audience.
 - Tom reiterated the rules restricting questions from the floor.
 - Only qualified voting directors would be heard, only one comment or question from each, limited to 1 minute's duration.
 - Responses to floor questions would also be limited to 1 minute's duration.
 - A variety of comments and questions were proposed from the floor, each speaker identifying themselves and the neighborhood they represent.
 - In several instances, responses to the questions posed were given by both Buena Vista and Bartlett Park, each limited to 1 minute.
- At 8:20 PM, there was a call for the question. Mike Gulley and Barbara Hawkins collected the ballot and subsequently announced the vote: Yes=2, No=32 [Motion by Buena Vista failed.]
- Our next speaker was Jeff Frank, Chair. of the CONA Public Safety Committee. He appealed to all neighborhoods as well as individuals to complete and submit responses to the CONA Crime Survey, [see CONA web site: "CONA Questionnaire About Crime"].
 - The compiled results will be reviewed with the executives of our St. Petersburg Police Department.
 - The Committee is developing a "Playbook" providing guidance to Neighborhood Crime Watch Groups on gathering and compiling data on local crime threats.
- We were reminded that August fifth will be "National Night Out" this year. Neighborhood associations are invited to coordinate their activities with S.P.P.D., [Officer Johnnie Harris- 893-7559], though current budget restraints will restrict Police visits to just 2 neighborhoods.
- City Councilman, (and former CONA President), Karl Nurse spoke next of two issues currently under consideration by Council.
 - A proposal has been introduced to expedite codes enforcement, under Todd Yost, to address many quality of life issues.
 - Foreclosure Prevention is to be the theme of two public meetings, (August 16th and October 18), that will bring together at-risk mortgage holders, government agencies and several local banking officers in an effort to prevent possible/pending foreclosures.

■ After reminding us to promote participation at our August 26th primary elections, our President invited attending election candidates to briefly introduce themselves to our audience.

■ The President then announced Open Forum.

- Judy Ellis, (Lakewood), urged the city initiate a traffic control scheme, used else where, that provides neighborhood teams with radar speed guns and warning letters to be sent to violators.
- The new President of Bayou Highlands solicited advice on the ethical restraints of accepting political ads for newsletters.
- Dave Hoover, (Riviera Bay), urged our members to schedule a presentation, at one of our monthly meetings, by the County Supervisor of Elections. These will do much to encourage voter participation. [The Sunshine Center will feature such a meeting on July 23rd.]

■ Announcing our next meeting would be August 20th, our meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

Claude Yves Jenet (1936 - 2008)
