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St. Petersburg Neighborhood Housing Services offers “FREE” Foreclosure Counseling Services

St. Petersburg Neighborhood Housing Services, Inc. (SPNHS) is a not-for-profit neighborhood revitalization and community housing development organization (CHDO) dedicated to providing affordable housing and homeownership solutions to individuals & families. Incorporated in 1980, SPNHS has provided homebuyer education-counseling services to thousands of residents and helped hundreds of families in Tampa Bay become homeowners.

Current record levels of unemployment are causing millions of American families to fall behind on their mortgages and many to lose their homes. The record number of foreclosures is affecting every neighborhood and having a devastating effect on property values and our sense of community.

Free Foreclosure Counseling Services

Since 2007, SPNHS has provided free foreclosure counseling to over 1000 Tampa Bay homeowners (nearly 450 so far in 2009) and prevented many families from losing their homes.

Unfortunately, of the 12,000+ St. Petersburg residents receiving foreclosure notices, only 1 out of 13 is seeking the “free” counseling services SPNHS has available. According to a recently published congressional report from Neighborworks America, 76% of homeowners who underwent government-established counseling remained in their homes as of February 2009. The resounding message for troubled borrowers is to seek assistance early, as the chances of avoiding foreclosure are much higher.

Part of this committee's mission is to help neighbors determine the difference. With unemployment high and housing prices weak, there may not be enough resources to maintain the home and selling may not be an option.

So far we have found people skilled at working with the City, people skilled at helping people beautify their property, people skilled at helping people avoid foreclosure, people skilled at helping people have the persistence to get slumlords to clean up their act. (a painfully slow process), as well as knowing where to go to find professional help. CONA Committee Reports

Land Development and Historic Resources

Chair Will Michaels

After months of activity on the part of CONA and other groups the City Council unanimously finally agreed to rezone the Al Lang Stadium site (actually known as Waterfront Park) as part of the Downtown Park Zoning District. Additionally, on a 5 to 2 vote, the Council agreed to reduce the maximum permissible height of any structure on the Al Lang site from 300 feet to 75 feet (the small spring training stadium there is approximately 66 feet) and on the nearby Mahaffey and new Dali sites from 300 to 200 feet. Under the Land Development Regulations approved in 2007 the Al Lang site was zoned Downtown Center 3 (DC-3) allowing for condos, offices, hotels, and specialty retail. The Al Lang site is a part of our early leaders' "Great Vision" for a Downtown Waterfront Park System created in 1909-1910. Former CONA President and City Council Member Karl Nurse deserves much of the credit for restoring Al Lang to its original purpose. Also thanks to all CONA association members who participated in this great work, and a special thanks to Marilyn Olsen of the Downtown Neighborhood Association for her efforts, including personally contacting each city council member. Now we can all proceed to celebrate the Centennial of the Waterfront Parks.

CONA has also joined with Saint Petersburg Preservation (SPP) in advocating for changes in the historic preservation ordinance to further enhance protection of our historic resources and make the transfer of development rights process more user-friendly. The City Council Public Service and Infrastructure Committee will hold a workshop on the proposed changes on July 16, 9:15AM at City Hall. Persons interested in historic preservation are encouraged to attend this meeting. Also SPP will hold a "Historic Preservation Summit: for candidates for Mayor on Wednesday, July 29th, 7PM.

Current workings in City and County

Here are your July updates on issues affecting all of us.

2010 Budget – July 9th City Council Public Forum: Plan on attending and speaking at the July 9th City Council Public Forum on the Budget. Be at City Hall early to get a seat. Public Forum starts at 6PM.

Free Foreclosure Counseling: Neighborhood Housing Services provides "free" counseling assistance to help homeowners in foreclosure manage their foreclosure or remediate their mortgage. They also provide Home Buyer Education courses designed to help people achieve the dream of home ownership. Go to www.stpetenhs.org for more information.

More "Paris Gardens" to be planted in memory of Paris Hamilton: A beautiful front yard garden was installed at the Preston Avenue home in Bartlett Park where the shooting took place. There is now a waiting list of neighbors who would like "Paris Gardens" installed. Transitional Housing – Federal Stimulus Funds: Community Housing is working with a group of city and community leaders to focus on the goal of pursuing federal stimulus funds and other resources to create jobs, serve needy individuals, stimulate our local economy and restore idle property to a productive use.

Waterfront Park Centennial: Peter Belmont and Cathy Martin are chairing the Steering Committee planning this 2010 year long event. New Year's Eve will start the celebration with a family oriented fun event highlighting some of the historic features of our waterfront parks. In partnership with many other groups, activities will be taking place in all of the waterfront parks from North Shore to Poynter Park. Volunteers are needed for all these events. Pier Task Force: CONA VP Will Michaels and DNA President Marilyn Olsen are serving on this 20 member Pier Task Force. Will chairs the Design Sub-committee. The Task Force is charged with providing multiple re-development alternatives for the Pier, identifying the estimated operating subsidy, reviewing the status of the Pier and identifying funding estimates for alternatives. The Task Force recommendations are due to City Council no later than February 25, 2010.

CONA BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S MEETING MINUTES

The Sunshine Multi-Service Center - June 17, 2009

- Our meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag led by President Barbara Heck.
- The President welcomed visiting City Council members and local election candidates joining us this evening. She also welcomed the officers of our newest neighborhood association, Pasadena Vista.
- Susan Ajoc, Director of the Neighborhood Partnership Office described our upcoming Florida Neighborhood's Conference, (FNC), which will convene this year in St. Petersburg, July ninth through the eleventh.
 - The anticipated conference attendance of 300 to 400 has only 250 applicants thus far. [Best year- Ft. Lauderdale saw 1200 attendees.]
 - Though some cities sponsor these programs, FNC is not funded by St. Petersburg.
 - Moved, (Cathy Wilson- Woodlawn), CONA to fund 4 scholarships, (4 X \$50 = \$200.) for the FNC. [Approved]
 - Susan also reviewed this year's Neighborhood Grant Program. Though not yet funded, they anticipate \$100,000. will be available for grants. Her staff and CONA Mentors will be available to assist in grant preparation. September 5th is the grant application deadline.
- We next heard from Realtor Helen Torres, the long standing sponsor of the annual free Florida Orchestra "Concert In The Park". We learned of her 16 years of financial support, and the fact that the city has currently suspended their contribution. Support from member neighborhood associations was encouraged to overcome the funding shortfall.
- CONA V.P. Will Michaels urged us to attend the June 18th Council Meeting where the status of Al Lang Field will be voted on. [E-mails to your City Councilmen were urged.] At issue is the inclusion of Al Lang in the Waterfront Park Zone, and a 75 foot height limitation on any future construction at site.
- Scott Swift, speaking for the St. Petersburg Neighborhood Housing Service, offered many details of their education and assistance program to avoid home mortgage foreclosures in this current depressed market.
 - Established in 1980 they have helped 1,100 homes avoid foreclosure and assisted 500, here, to become homeowners.
 - 1,114 foreclosures have been filed here in May, yet only one in thirteen homeowners has sought help! The Housing Service council ling is free.
 - Of the threatened homes, 76% who seek counseling have kept their homes.
 - Buyer Classes are popular now, because of current opportunities. Mortgage rates are low, (5.5%), and many banks are short selling at only 60% of face values. Let's move more home renters into home owners.
 - With no advertising budget, the Neighborhood Housing Service needs your help to spread the word of the classes and council they offer.
- Cass Rael Sr. (N. Kenwood), announced plans for another CONA Baseball at The Dome, set for Sunday, August 16th. Last year we sold 246 tickets.
 - Parking, food ticket deals and the pass price are yet to be negotiated.
- Jeff Frank, (Live Oaks), reminded us to celebrate National Night Out on Tuesday, August Fourth.
 - Each Neighborhood Crime Watch makes their own arrangements. Celebrities from the SPPD will visit the programs at Harris Park and Historic Uptown.
 - Promotional door hangers are available from the Police Department as well a limited quantity of "Club" car theft protectors for raffles.
- We then heard an extended presentation by Sarah Ward from the Metropolitan Planning Organization, (MPO). They have a federal mandate to develop and maintain 35 year future projections of the transportation needs of our area.
 - She noted that two of our City Councilmen, Jeff Danner and Herb Polson sit on the MPO Policy Board.
 - The MPO is proactively seeking public inputs to their developing transportation plans. [<http://www.pinellascounty.org/MPO/>]
 - Their planning includes bicycle, car, and waterway passages as well as a variety of rail transportation. The TBARTA 7 county transportation plan coordination was noted.
 - We saw numerous maps which defined development plans for car, bus, and rail along major arteries throughout Pinellas County.
 - PSTA anticipates doubling of their ridership in the next decade. They cannot use federal "Stimulus" money for operations, only for capital.
 - The current policy focus is on pedestrian traffic and safety.
- City government was not prepared to discuss budget issues with us tonight. There will be a budget hearing before our CONA July meeting. The 112 page draft city budget can be downloaded from the city site now. www.stpete.org
- Our Treasurer could not be with us tonight. Her current report will be published on our web site: www.conastpete.org
- Mike Gulley, V.P., provided a brief report of plans for our CONA Task Force seeking to promote "Neighbors Helping Neighbors" in an integrated effort to improve the quality of life in all of our neighborhoods.
 - We anticipate the early vacation return of Tom Killian, (Jungle Terrace), who has led our CONA Mentoring Team.
 - Bartlett Park, site of the Police CAPE II Program will be the first involvement for the new CONA Task Force.
 - June 20th saw the first phase of the "Paris Gardens Project" along Preston Avenue. It is anticipated that this volunteer project will be extended to many areas of our city.
- New Business: We heard a complaint that our 911 emergency phone system is too slow responding.
 - We were reminded that individuals using internet (IP) phone service providers often do not provide caller I.D. so location of caller must be reported aurally.
 - Jeff Frank, (Live Oak), reported that he has established a listbot network for his neighborhood crime watch coordinators.
 - Ron Rolland, (Central Oak Park) reported their reorganized Crime Watch has 63 members and 9 crime watch coordinators. They logged over 1,500 calls for police service in the last 50 days.
 - Moved, (R. Rolland), that CONA conveys, in writing, to the Mayor and all city departments, that Central Oak Park is a recognized member neighborhood of CONA and should be provided with the same response to call for services as all other St. Petersburg neighborhood associations. [Discussion followed]
 - A need for more review of the situation was called for.
 - It was pointed out that CONA membership provides no guarantee of good city response to call for services.
 - The CONA Board is always prepared to discuss neighborhood problems addressing city department service issues with the leaders of neighborhood organizations.
 - Moved, (Cass Rael Sr. - N. Kenwood), to defer motion appealing for a supporting letter from CONA, until the next Board meeting. [Approved]
 - Rolland was urged to schedule a meeting with his Central Oak Park Board and our CONA Board, but he left the meeting!

Our meeting adjourned at 9:15 PM.
