Courtwatch Committee

This program is designed, in part, to help the residents of the City of St. Petersburg gain a better understanding of how the court system works. Through the presence of a unified community, judges will understand that it is expected that perpetrators be held fully responsible for their actions and punished accordingly.

This program shows victims and their families that their neighbors want to see justice served in their cases, and it is developing better relationships between the courts, police and citizens.

Court Watch representatives are the "watchdogs" of the community because they help victims and neighbors monitor court cases while establishing a visible presence during trials. Court Watch gives residents of St. Petersburg the opportunity to learn how the criminal justice system works, who the judges are, and what sentences are imposed.

Court Watch recruits and trains community volunteers to attend hearings and trials. These volunteers report basic information and give impressions of the performances of judges and prosecutors.

Court Watchers show victims that they have community support. By making a statement to criminals that crime will not be tolerated they also support police, prosecutors, and judges who apprehend and punish those that harm others.

We are looking for volunteers to participate in Court Watch. If you can please feel free to contact me.

VICTORY!! For the Jennie Hall Pool at the CPC

Many thanks, to all of you who stepped forward to speak, and to those who wrote letters in support of the Jennie Hall Pool application.

The Community Preservation Commission (CPC) hearing was a moment in history itself. Many members of the community, of all colors, spoke eloquently and poignantly of their histories which evoked much emotion in the room. Many in the audience had tears. They were tears of relief, pain, gratitude and, I think, brotherhood. Your stories were all beautiful.

It is certainly a Right thing when an application for designation meets with a Commission who votes, not only unanimously for approval but comments that their approval is a "resounding yes". So, that is the first round. Round two and three (first and second readings) before the Council have yet to be conquered. Please mark your calendar for the second reading, which you will be able to speak at. You may, of course, attend both.

COUNCIL HEARINGS:

FIRST READING: Thursday, November 21 - 9am City Hall

SECOND READING: Thursday, December 1 - 9am City Hall

We still need those letters to keep coming in and we will need speakers for the second reading. If you have spoken already at the CPC you will be able to speak again, to the Council at the second reading. It is important that you speak again because this is a new audience. The Council had not yet heard from you. So keep your speech handy, you can use it again. And, if you know of anyone who has a special story to tell about Jennie Hall or their "pool" experience please urge them to come and tell the Council members. I am sure they will be well received. Even more important their story will be captured in the record.

Diversity Committee

The CONA Diversity Committee met on October 18th at the Davis Center. Our agenda included review of the "St. Pete Together" Report; Review of the City Charter Amendments; Update on the Jennie Hall Pool Landmarking Effort; and Review of the proposed African American Heritage Trail. Kai Warren (Historic Roser Park) assisted us with review of the St. Pete Together Report as he was a member of the group convened by Community Tampa Bay under the auspices of the City Council. The overall recommendation of the group was that respectful dialogue to improve trust and communication between racial and ethnic groups needs to be more deeply embraced by the city, and that dialogue and inclusion needs to be promoted consistently. City Government Commissions and Task Forces as well as not for profit boards and community associations need to assure that they are inclusive. The report states that "there is a perception that Boards throughout the City are not diverse--racially, by age, socio-economic status, residence, etc." The report calls upon the Chamber of Commerce, CONA, and City Government to consider taking a lead in organizing and promoting greater inclusiveness throughout the community. City Council Chair Jim Kennedy has since also convened a group to formal-

ize an organization "to promote and nurture healthy intergroup relationships, respect, and community unity." The group is using the former bi-racial Community Alliance as a general model, although its exact mission, structure, and activities will be worked out over the next six months. Mike Gulley and I are participating in the endeavor.

After reviewing the City Charter Review Commission's proposed City Charter Amendments, the Diversity Committee recommended a "yes" vote on all amendments. The importance of approving the amendment calling for a Downtown Waterfront Parks Master Plan was particularly noted. (The Committee's recommendation was approved by the CONA Board at its October meeting.) It is noted the Charter Review Commission also reported that the City does not have a general policy statement recognizing the importance of diversity. Two CONA Members served on the Charter Review Commission--Ali Montsho of Westminster Heights and Darden Rice of Old Southeast. Congratulations to both for taking on this important civic responsibility. The Diversity Committee also enthusiastically supported the landmarking of Jennie Hall pool--a community resource not only of great personal importance to many residents, but also a reminder of both the past oppression of segregation and discrimination, and the sacrifice, courage and determination of a white school teacher to do what she could to provide descent swimming facilities for the black community. The landmarking was unanimously approved by the City Community Preservation Commission in a very passionate hearing in late October. The City Council will next hold hearings on the morning of December 1. All CONA Members are urged to send an email to the Council (Council@stpete.org) supporting the landmarking, and if possible attend the hearing on December 1st. Finally, the Committee reviewed and applauded the proposed African American Heritage Trail. The City is now taking recommendations for locations and buildings to be included in the trail. For more information contact Rick MacAulay at the City (Rick.MacAulay@stpete.org).

Issues at Maximo Park

City Proposal: To Approve an "After the Fact Certificate of Appropriateness for an 18 Hole Disc Golf Course in Maximo Park and Archaeological Site" is scheduled for hearing:

**November 18th, - 9am - City Hall, St. Pete.
175 5th Av. N Community Preservation
Commission (CPC) – City Hall**

Reasons to NOT TO APPROVE by Ray Wunderlich III and Beth Connor:

Maximo Park is a complex assortment of centuries old Native American archaeology, bayside recreation and unique, rare Florida plant communities. It has had an almost continuous slide of mismanagement and bad decisions. An 18-hole disc golf course was illegally (by City regulations and ordinances) constructed at mostly taxpayer expense in Maximo in 2001 on top of archaeological and environmentally sensitive areas. Many of the players do not live in St. Petersburg. The ecology and archaeology have suffered. The natural landscape is greatly diminished and ill managed. One gopher tortoise is left. The listed species fox squirrel is extirpated and marsh rabbit is gone. The City contends crime has decreased due to disc golf's presence. This is THE reason they allowed its construction, albeit illegally. The "proposal, a few sentences

was grossly under proposed. We feel crime did decrease, with other mitigating factors helping greatly. In addition with the City's overall decreases in crime. We would like to see disc golf moved to another more appropriate location(s). To a more planned, sustainable area. Maximo needs a management plan designed and followed by the City for its unique resources encompassing Heritage Tourism as a tread softly entity (adding a new resource to our tourist driven economy). We are concerned not only for the short-term health of Maximo, but the long-term sustainability of this resource as well. The incremental destruction of our rare, and unique ecological and archaeological area is not acceptable.

If the course is having growth pains now, as the ecological/ archaeological resources are gravely challenged, were does this put Maximo 10, 20 or 30 years from now?

CONA supports The City of St Petersburg on County wide issues.

CONA is currently supporting the City's position on both the County EMS proposal and the County's LPA 18-9-11, a Proposed Pinellas County Ordinance amending the Land Development Code.

LPA 18-9-11 would implement Countywide Authority to operate, maintain, develop and control certain County facilities and properties designated as Properties of Countywide importance. The CONA Board of Directors, at the September 21, 2011 meeting and again at the October 19, 2011 meeting had concerns over the implementation of LPA 18-9-11 and would respectfully request voting to NOT vote in favor of the ordinance. The County voted on October 25 to approve the ordinance by a vote of 4-3.

The current County EMS proposal will strip about \$7 million from the City of St Petersburg's EMS budget and increase response times for first responder emergency medical calls. The County has presented their case to CONA as has the City of St Petersburg and a third proposal from the Lealman Fire department. At this time there is no final resolve on the matter as the County and City continue negotiations. Noise Law Update

The State's appeal of the Pinellas court's finding that the car stereo law is unconstitutional is scheduled for oral argument in February. Until a decision comes down, we will continue to be unprotected against almost every source of noise in this state – any ordinance that relies on “plainly audible” is on the shelf until we get a ruling. Meanwhile, however, it is worth remembering that Mayor Foster has a “soft letter” program that allows citizens to report loud car stereos, which continue to plague certain areas of the city.

If you see a car making unnecessary noise with its audio system, you can email the Mayor with the tag, make and color of the car, date and time of the offense, and the location. The Mayor's office will send out a “soft letter” reminding the offender that the city frowns on antisocial behavior and requesting that he be more considerate. It may not sound like something that works, but in about 8 cases out of 10 it shuts the boomer down. If you're trapped at a red light by one of these noisemakers, take a moment to jot down the tag and then email mayor@stpete.org.

CONA BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S MEETING MINUTES

The Sunshine Multi-Service Center - October 19, 2011

- President Mike Gulley opened our meeting leading us in the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag
- After calling for any corrections or additions to our September Board Minutes, as published in our Newsletter, hearing none, the President announced that they stand approved.
- Our Treasurer, April Gausman reported our current balance as \$1,858.83. With no questions from the floor, they will be filed for audit.
- City Council Candidates Bob Kersteen and Bill Dudley were invited to briefly introduce themselves to our audience.
- City Council Representative Jeff Danner offered an explanation of the proposed Pinellas County Ordinance that effectively exempts the county from all local municipal codes and fees when applied to any major county project involvements, including on Pinellas rights of way, within their community.
 - Councilman Danner spoke proudly of our award winning Land Development Codes that would be abrogated by any Pinellas County Project.
 - He also spoke of the revised county plans for the Toy Town Landfill that conflict with the agreed development scheme when originally transferred from city to county jurisdiction.
 - Implications of codes annulment on airport property were cited as another concern.
 - We have already surrendered our codes authority to school board properties; we should not yield our authority to the county as well.
 - Dave Goodwin, of our City Legal Staff, noted that there will be a City Council Resolution opposing the exemption legislation proposed by Pinellas County.
 - There will be a public hearing on this proposed county ordinance on October 25th. at 6:30 p.m. in the County Court House, Clearwater.
 - Moved, (Heck- Snell Isle), CONA joins our City Council Resolution objecting to the proposed Pinellas County Ordinance that would exempt county projects from local municipal codes and fees. [Motion Approved]
 - It was noted that other municipalities have raised similar objections.
- Tim Martin, Chair of CONA's Environment and Energy Committee introduced Mario Farias of the PACE Organization committed to developing solar energy resources.
 - His organization has recently arranged for the relocation of two foreign solar panel fabrication facilities to Florida with significant employment potentials.
 - PACE is assembling bank financial arrangements which will facilitate long term loans to meet the extended utilization periods of current solar panel installations, spreading the cost over 20 years. The loans are matched to the anticipated annual electric savings.
- The federal mortgage loan institutions, (e.g. Fanny Mae, & Freddy Mac), currently do not approve such loan arrangements for business organizations, though that group of consumers currently uses 40% of the electric generated here.
- Their funding arrangements can be facilitated by establishing a local special tax District, (similar to a Special Fire District). These don't require any municipal funding. All applicants are volunteer participants.
- We next shared a video introduced by James Bramble, of Neighborhood Home Solution, [formerly Neighborhood Housing Service]. Their organization is certified by the federal HUD Authority. They do not charge for their counseling.
 - This organization has been serving our community for over 30 years.
 - Their clients are not restricted to only low income families.
 - 76% of the families they work with have kept their homes and avoided foreclosure.
 - With no advertising budget, they appeal for word-of-mouth promotion. They seek invitations to address local neighborhood organizations.
 - NHS has numerous partnering agencies including Fanny Mae.
- We next hear from City Councilman Karl Nurse inviting us to attend an initial meeting, [Sunshine Center, Monday 10/25/11, at 6:30 p.m.], of a new committee that he has labeled the Codes Focus Group.
 - Hoping to attract volunteers from diverse neighborhoods, their work will be to develop the first major overhaul of our municipal Codes Enforcement in more than a decade.
 - A crisis of dilapidated housing has evolved from the practice of purchasing delinquent tax bills, via the internet, by absent landlords who, too often, have no clear plan for the use or sale of these properties.
 - Karl's goal will be to preclude foreclosure by banks or if they elect to abandon the foreclosure, his group would seek to transfer the title to some community not-for-profit organization with the financial capacity to restore the property for occupancy.
 - Cleanup crews from the Salvation Army have played an important role in codes compliance in Tampa.
- Theresa McEachern, speaking for her Nominations Committee solicited nominations for our CONA Officers prior to our November nominations meeting.
- Ingrid Comberg reported on the annual reunion of the

CONA Leadership Class, noting that three current members of our City Council are alumni.

- Will Michaels spoke for his CONA Diversity Committee. [He preceded his report distributing lawn signs for the upcoming Boyd Hill Park Festival].
 - His committee heard a report from the Tampa Bay Together Organization that was recruited, by City Council, to study the issue of improving ethnic community relations within our city.
 - Noting that two CONA Members recently served on the Charter Review Commission, (DRC), [normally convened only each decade], Will listed three charter revision proposals that CONA may recommend:
 - 1). To reset the lease duration for port facilities from 10 to 25 years allowing more time to amortize the needed capitalization.
 - 2). Adjust the tax incentive schedule to increase the appeal to prospective developers to bring more employment opportunities to our residents.
 - 3). Require development of a master plan for our water front development that would embrace the multiplicity of concepts for the various addresses that currently guide development.

- Moved, (Michaels, V.P.), CONA supports the three city charter revisions that have been proposed by the current sitting Charter Review Commission.

- Our Public Safety Committee lauded the work of our Police Department to disband the obnoxious gathering at a local liquor store that spilled into adjoining lots during late night hours.
 - We were urged to attend a meeting of the Nuisance Abatement Board on November first when they will consider complaints against the Stadium Economy Inn.
- We were reminded of the upcoming Kenwood Bungalowfest on November 5th.
- Barbara Heck, (Snell Isle), invited all to the Chili Cook-off at the Ale & Witch, Courtyard of Plaza Towers (111 Second Ave. N.E.), a fund raising competition, for Officer's Families, between the St. Pete. Police and Fire Departments. The food and fun is November 5th from 4 to 9 p.m.

Our meeting adjourned at 8:10 p.m.

Back to the Future

It has been pointed out that our 9 month school schedule is really a result of the agri based economy that was present at the start this nation. The school kids were needed in the fields 3 months out of the year and thus the resulting 9 month school schedule. Over the years we have maintained the summer off schedule and we are now at a point that we have

challenges finding meaningful activities for our youth... Maybe we need them back in the fields, or in this case, gardens.

Our urban agriculture group (we are still struggling with a final name) is currently applying for a grant from Bon Secours St. Petersburg Health System which will allow us to put together a business plan, objectives, and build a data base of current gardens – 7 unique gardens are being visited on November 4 and November 11.

Currently we have 3 CONA members participating in the visioning of this group – Andrea, Hildebran, Tim Martin and Mike Gulley. We are meeting every Friday at the Chamber of Commerce, 100 2nd Ave N. All are welcome. This can have huge implications for our neighborhoods and the youth that will someday carry the torch for us.
